The UK section of the ECOSAL-ATLANTIS salt route is divided into five regional areas.

Each region has principal sites with interpretation facilities that can direct you to other sites in the network. Uncover stories of salt works and salt makers spread throughout England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.

Discover artisan sea salt producers, archaeological sites and cultural heritage associated with salt. Seek out the smaller sites scattered around our coast.

Explore varied cultural links to walking trails, ecology, artists and gastronomy that exist in each region and the links to sites outside the Atlantic region.

Salt making from 'wild brine' is known in Cheshire from pre-Roman times, with rock salt mining from 1670. 'Sleeching' was used on the coast. Large coal-fuelled pan houses developed as did the refining of rock salt. A working rock salt mine still operates at Winsford.


